



Brief Guide to Referencing with SBS system

This is a guide to the SBS system but you should always check your course handbook and/or module outline for any further guidance, as your lectures may prefer a different style of referencing.

Introduction:

This guide gives advice on referencing using the SBS System. This is the preferred referencing system for the School of Biological Sciences at the Xi'an Jiaotong-Liverpool University. There are numerous different types of referencing systems available, but the most important thing is to be consistent. Most style guides fall into two commonly used systems: 1) author-date system (Harvard, APA) and 2) numeric system (Vancouver, MLA). In the School of Biological Sciences, a typical author-date scheme for citing books and journal articles is adopted, which is similar to that used by many biological journals. In the main text of your work you should refer to your source for a specific fact, idea or quote as you go along, normally (but not always) at the end of the sentence or paragraph containing it. And at the end of your essay or report, you should include an alphabetical (by last name) reference list. This guide suggests a style within the SBS system which aligns with the guidance of the University of Liverpool.

Plagiarism:

When writing assignments you must acknowledge the source of your ideas and quotes in sufficient detail so that readers can locate the item. Referencing is important to avoid plagiarism, to verify quotations and to enable readers to follow up what you have written and locate the cited work. Plagiarism is defined by Xi'an Jiaotong-Liverpool University Student Regulations as "Reproducing material from other works or a paraphrase of such material without acknowledgement". For more information on how to avoid plagiarism please refer to the Department of Registry.

Collecting and organizing references:

It is often not easy (or possible) to retrieve sources after you have written your text. For this reason it is best to write down all the citation details of a source as you use it, and to compile a reference list at the end of the document that includes full details of all references cited. Bibliographic software, such as **EndNote**, **RefWorks**, or **Zotero**, will help you organize your references according to different citation systems and to add the citations to your text.

Two parts in SBS system:

- **In-text citation** – Citing in the text of your work: this means acknowledging, within your text, the sources that you have used.
- **Referencing List** – These are the details of the sources you have used. You list them in alphabetical order at the end of your work.

In-text citations:

- In an author-date style, in-text citations usually require the name of the author(s) and the year of publication.
- A page number is included if you have a direct quote, paraphrase a passage or you want to direct the reader to a specific page. Page numbers may also be included if you are referring to a long work and the page numbers might be useful to the reader.

How to create a reference list/bibliography:

- A reference list contains only the books, articles, and web pages etc. that are cited in the text of the document. A bibliography includes all sources consulted for background or further reading.
- A reference list is arranged alphabetically by author.
- If you have more than one item with the same author, list the items chronologically, starting with the earliest publication.

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Books

Elements of citation

Author (s) of book – family name and initials (Year of publication). *Title of book – italicised*. Edition (other than the 1st edition) ed. pp. Page number (s).
Publisher, Place of publication.

Note: If you wish to cite an entire book, include the names of editors if relevant, as shown for Bates & Maxwell (1993), followed by ‘Ed.’ or ‘Eds.’ in parentheses.

Elements of the citation

Author (s) of chapter – family name and initials (Year of publication). Title of chapter. In *Title of book – italicised*, Edition (Editor(s) – family name and initials, Ed(s).), pp. Page number(s). Publisher, Place of publication.

Elements of the citation

Author (s) of journal article – family name and initials (Year of publication). Title of journal article. *Title of Journal (abbreviated) – italicised & the first letter of each word capitalized* **Volume**, Page number(s). doi (for electronic journal articles)

Elements of the citation

Editor (s) (Year of publication). *Title of conference – italicised*, p. Page number (s). Date of conference. Place of conference. Publisher, Place of publication (if available).

Author – family name and initials (Date of degree). *Title – italicised*. Type of publication. Institution granting the degree, Place of institution.

Elements of the citation

Author of report – family name and initials (Year of publication). *Title of report – italicised*. Name of Co., Place of Co.. Report number.

Web pages

Elements of the citation

Author (s) of page – person or organization (Year-page created or revised) Title of page. *Publisher – italicised*. Full Web address (URL) [date accessed mm/dd/yy]
